## Standalone Measures

<b>Plans/Reports</b> <i>Output</i>	
<b>Definition</b>	The number of plans or reports developed as a result of an ARC project
<b>Example grant activities</b>	Needs assessments, comprehensive community plans, strategic plans
<b>How might this be measured?</b>	Number of plans/reports
<b>Typical timeframe</b>	By grant closeout
<b>Additional guidance</b>	

<b>Programs Implemented</b> <i>Outcome</i>	
<b>Definition</b>	The number of new programs implemented as a result of an ARC project
<b>Example grant activities</b>	Initiatives designed to increase the involvement of citizens in the community, development of a community program or foundation, leadership development program, healthy living program, small-scale signage or revitalization improvements, volunteer transportation provider program
<b>How might this be measured?</b>	Number of programs implemented
<b>Typical timeframe</b>	Up to three years after project completion

	<b>Communities Served</b> <i>Output</i>	<b>Communities Improved</b> <i>Outcome</i>
<b>Definition</b>	The number of communities served or impacted by an ARC project	The number of communities with enhanced capacity as a result of an ARC project
<b>Example grant activities</b>	Needs assessments; comprehensive community plans; strategic plans; initiatives designed to increase the involvement of citizens in the community; organizing meetings, conferences, and forums; development of a community organization, program, foundation, or association; provide or obtain technical assistance/consultation; leadership training; development, purchase, publishing, or distribution of materials; mentoring/counseling; identifying leadership assets in the community; distribution of mini-grants	
<b>How might this be measured?</b>	Number of communities that stand to benefit from the project	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Number of participating communities demonstrating increased community pride, civic participation, diversity of participation, self-reliance, capacity to identify and address local issues, capacity to contribute to community-building efforts, improved citizen perceptions of how represented they are in decision-making</li> <li>• Increase in civic participation aids such as accessibility services, ombudsman services, meetings scheduled to accommodate availability of citizens, etc.</li> <li>• Increased number of volunteers/volunteer hours for projects</li> <li>• New community organizations formed</li> <li>• Increase in successful local bond issues</li> <li>• Leveraging increased external resources</li> </ul>
<b>Typical timeframe</b>	By grant closeout	Up to 3 years after grant closeout

<b>Definition</b>	The number of organizations served by an ARC project	The number of organizations with a measurable improvement as a result of an ARC project
<b>Example grant activities</b>	Needs assessments; strategic plans; initiatives designed to increase the involvement of citizens in the community; organizing meetings, conferences, and forums; provide or obtain technical assistance/consultation; leadership training; development, purchase, publishing, or distribution of materials or equipment; mentoring/counseling; distribution of mini-grants; hiring or contracting with individuals to perform work for the organization	
<b>How might this be measured?</b>	Number of organizations that stand to benefit from project	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Number of organizations reporting increased collaboration, enhanced efficiency and effectiveness, enhanced stability/growth, and enhanced client/customer satisfaction.</li> <li>• Number of organizations reporting an increase in grant proposals submitted or grant proposals funded; better ratios of grant proposals funded to grant proposals submitted, both collectively and for each organization; collaborative projects with local business groups; collaborative projects among organizations; new involvement in community projects; or media stories that cover organization activities</li> <li>• Number of organizations reporting an increase in cash on hand, cash in reserve, available working capital, net assets, diversity of funding sources, board member financial contributions, board meeting attendance, total funds raised, new donors/contributors, number of programs, program participation, expanded services or providing services to new groups, for example, underserved groups or those not previously reached</li> <li>• Number of organizations reporting an increase in staffing, membership, or number of board vacancies filled; number of organizations reporting lower</li> </ul>

<b>Definition</b>	The number of individual participants served or targeted by an ARC project	The number of participants with a measurable improvement as a result of an ARC project
<b>Example grant activities</b>	Initiatives designed to increase the involvement of citizens in the community; organizing meetings, conferences, and forums; leadership training; mentoring/counseling	
<b>How might this be measured?</b>	Number of participants that stand to benefit from project	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Number of participants meeting goals of program, e.g., demonstrating enhanced skills, increased awareness of community issues, or enhanced empowerment, as demonstrated through surveys or assessments</li> <li>• Number of participants publicly recognized by their employer or organization, number of participants who serve as community leaders after completing the program, number of participants whose work is highlighted in media stories</li> </ul>
<b>Typical timeframe</b>	By grant closeout	Up to 3 years after grant closeout
<b>Additional guidance</b>	Use this measure when patients, students, or worker/trainee measures do not apply.	

	<b>Students served</b> <i>Output</i>	<b>Students improved</b> <i>Outcome</i>
<b>Definition</b>	The number of students served by an ARC project	The number of students with a measurable improvement as a result of an ARC project
<b>Example grant activities</b>	Initiatives designed to increase the involvement of citizens in the community; organizing meetings, conferences, and forums; leadership training; mentoring/counseling	
<b>How might this be measured?</b>	Number of students that stand to benefit from project	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Number of students demonstrating enhanced skills, increased awareness of community issues, enhanced empowerment, and/or commitment to staying in the Region, as demonstrated through surveys or assessments</li> <li>• Number of students publicly recognized by their school, college, or university; number of students who serve as community or school leaders after completing the program; number of students whose work is highlighted in media stories</li> </ul>
<b>Typical timeframe</b>	By grant closeout	Up to 3 years after grant closeout
<b>Additional guidance</b>	“Students” refers to those who are working towards a diploma or a degree
