Tips for Applying ARC Performance Measures to Your INSPIRE Project

INSPIRE SUD recovery-to-work ecosystem performance measures that are **REQUIRED for IMPLEMENTATION projects** include the following:

- Businesses served – For example, businesses that receive education, training, or similar activities, to promote adoption of a recovery-ready workplace, the employment of individuals in SUD recovery, or a partnership to continue building the ecosystem.
- Businesses improved – For example, businesses that have a clearer understanding of how individuals in SUD recovery can be an asset to their organization; businesses that hire individuals in SUD recovery; businesses that modify their policies to be a recovery-ready workplace; businesses in the community, region, or state that engage in activities to build, improve, or promote the SUD recovery to work ecosystem as a result of this project.
 - AND
- Workers/trainees served – For example, individuals receiving job, vocational, and/or employment support services that lead to job entry or reentry.
- Workers/trainees improved – For example, individuals obtaining a new skill that leads to job entry; getting higher pay or a better position; receiving job training that promotes obtaining or maintaining purposeful employment. **Note:** The definition of job obtainment can vary relative to the extent that the individual in SUD recovery is at a stable place in their life to obtain, and keep, a job for a period of time that is appropriate to their employment goals (or that business model) while also receiving, as necessary, wraparound services that promote maintenance of recovery and employment.
 - OR
- Students served – For example, individuals served through educational advancement (enrollment in a GED program, higher education, or trade-specific certification program)
- Students improved – For example, individuals improved by obtaining a diploma, degree, or certification (whether through a trade program, 2–4-year university or college, or similar entity).

Additional Implementation measures may include the following (optional):

- Participants served – For example, individuals who receive wraparound services through the ecosystem (dependent on the availability of resources) such as housing support or placement, food assistance, referral to legal services, and integration of peer support services to promote resource or attainment.

- Participants improved – For example, individuals who received services as appropriate to their needs that led to attainment of recovery capital, or engagement or reengagement in the workforce; peer support training that leads to peer employment.
- Communities served – Communities that receive education, training, or programming to understand, improve, or innovate the SUD recovery to work ecosystem.
- Communities improved – For example, communities that make targeted advancements or investments in building the SUD recovery to work ecosystem; communities that build coalitions, advisory boards, or similar group led efforts.
- Patients served – Individuals who receive treatment or clinical services that are appropriate to their health-related conditions. **Note:** Treatment services are restricted to behavioral health services, including post-SUD treatment wraparound services.
- Patients improved – Individuals whose health is improved (whether physically, mentally, etc.) as a direct result of medical or clinical services, such as use of medication-assisted treatment (MAT) to address their opioid use disorder or SUD. **Note:** Treatment services are restricted to behavioral health services, including post-SUD treatment wraparound services.

INSPIRE SUD Recovery to Work Ecosystem performance measures that are **REQUIRED for PLANNING projects** include the following:

- Plans/reports – This may include asset mapping, strategic plans, master plans, concept plans, or plans for ecosystem improvements or new programs, as well as research reports, feasibility studies, development of curriculum, etc.

Additional planning measures may include the following (optional):

- Communities served – Communities that receive education, training, or programming to understand, improve, or innovate the SUD recovery to work ecosystem.
- Communities improved – Communities that make targeted advancements or investments in building the SUD recovery-to-work ecosystem; communities that build coalitions, advisory boards, or similar group led efforts that aim to create or enhance the recovery ecosystem.
